LEVEL IIA CLASS AMPS UP THEIR TRAINING

The Level IIa class has added a fourth class per week, and some of the students have also begun preparatory pointework. Pre-Pointe is just that: preparing the female student for her first pair of pointe shoes. Pre-Pointe classes will build strength, stamina, alignment awareness and determination. Pointework requires all of these things, as well as a mature understanding and mastery of all basic technique. SCHEDULE SUMMER STUDY

Consistency is one of the most important building blocks toward solid classical ballet technique. Every year our students study diligently through the summer, making huge leaps in their progress. Summer is the ideal time to buckle down, take extra classes and work extra hard, unencumbered by the demands of academics. Dancers who study through the summer build the consistency that their bodies need for muscle memory to take hold in basics. Solid basics are the foundation on which the rest of our technique and eventually artistry is built. Consistency becomes even more key when students are at an intermediate level of accomplishment and are pursuing pointework. The Studio offers several summer programs for our dancers. We encourage you to take as much as possible and train diligently. Your progress is in your hands, and its rewards come with diligence and commitment.


SUMMER INTENSIVE PROGRAMS TWO WEEKS: JULY 22-AUGUST 2

Two of the pieces will be considered for a public performance at the Festival, one choreographed by Robert Kelley and the other, *La Volonta*, choreographed by Debra Pearse Rogo. Two of our dancers have also choreographed new pieces to be considered for performance in the Emerging Choreographers Concert, Flora Chatwin and AvaRose Dillon. One of the missions of The Ballet Alliance is to groom and promote new choreographers. Should Flora and/or AvaRose's piece be chosen for performance, the choreographers will also qualify for scholarship recognition to a choreography intensive.

Recruiters from professional companies and schools as well as prestigious college and university dance programs offer professional contracts, scholarships and early acceptance to dancers.
