Her skill as a dance conductor is unsurpassed in the field, which serves our dancers and audience alike. She has an expert eye when watching choreography and knows the score inside-out, so she can truly multi-task during each performance. This expertise creates a wonderful experience for our dancers. Dancing to live music supports the efforts of each dancer and inspires them beyond what recorded music can achieve. ### **A Tribute to Barbara Crockett**

Barbara Crockett passed away in August at the age of 101 years. She was a founding dancer with San Francisco Ballet, and with her husband Deane, she founded both the Sacramento Ballet and the Pacific Region of Regional Dance America (then called the National Association for Regional Ballet). She owned her own ballet school and trained many dancers, including our own artistic director Diane Cypher.

Her charges continue to dance and teach all over the world, thus keeping her legacy alive. Two standouts are Parrish Maynard and Jodie Gates (both classmates of Diane's). Parrish was a principal dancer with San Francisco Ballet and soloist with American Ballet Theatre, currently a Ballet Master at Kansas City Ballet. Jodie — newly appointed Artistic Director of Cincinnati Ballet — was the founding director of the Glorya Kaufman School of Dance at USC, and was a principal dancer with Pennsylvania Ballet after a career as a major star with the Joffrey Ballet in NYC.

Mrs. Crockett trained dancers who danced all over the world, in companies both large and small, in positions as principal dancers, choreographers, teachers and directors. Her students have danced on broadway and beyond (another standout is David Hodo, the Construction Worker of the Village People). The vast scope of her influence continues throughout the dance world through those she touched in her long teaching and directing career. All of The Studio students are in fact her grandchildren, as Barbara's influence on Diane's teaching and directing (and survival!) skills are a direct line to this great lady. We are lucky to embody some of her everyday traits: fairness, diligence, discipline, elegance and grace.


### Wear your Halloween Costume to Class the week of October 24

There will be Nutcracker rehearsals on Sunday, November 27 for ALL ROLES






#### NUTCRACKER COVID PROTOCOL

We are following State and CDC guidelines and **highly recommend** that dancers and audience members be fully vaccinated before entering the Civic Auditorium. We **highly recommend** that audience members wear masks while indoors.

The Santa Cruz Civic Auditorium has very high ceilings and a new air filtration system, which will run before, during and after performances. However, even with these safety measures in place, the State and CDC recommend wearing a mask while indoors.

Dancers may arrive with stage makeup already applied to reduce their risk of exposure. Dancers will remove masks when going onstage. Food between performances will be taken outside to a covered area in the parking lot, as last year. Bring warm cover-ups and booties for this purpose.

For the health and safety of yourself and others, do not attend or participate in the performance if you are feeling sick of exhibit any Covid symptoms. Kindly note that safety protocol can change if recommended by our state and federal health agencies.
