IT TAKES HOURS OF HARD WORK TO MAKE THIS LOOK EASY

As you know, our dancers are working hard in rehearsals for the upcoming production of "The Nutcracker." We appreciate their dedication and also appreciate the support that their parents and families provide during this busy time. We hope they enjoy the path to performance.

Snowflakes is the most challenging of all the corps de ballet sections in "The Nutcracker," requiring advanced pointe technique, solid allegro skills, allaround technical and musical precision, as well as exceptional spatial awareness and conformity.







LEVEL III GIRLS ARE ON THEIR WAY TO THEIR FIRST PAIR OF POINTE SHOES

The Level III class is taking a minimum of seven weekly ballet classes: 5 Ballet Technique and 2 Preparatory Pointe, to build the strength, flexibility, stamina and mental maturity required for pointework. Pointework requires a major amount of technical understanding and achievement. At The Studio, we carefully prepare each student for this new milestone and we require much more than other studios do. Individual students and different classes progress at different rates. Ideally, the entire class progresses together and goes on pointe together. This, however, is not always the case.

Most important to achieving success en pointe is being prepared. We take this very seriously. Dancers who studied hard through the summer are already more prepared than others. Those who take extra classes are building the strength and stamina they need. Let's not forget flexibility. The foot and ankle joints must be flexible enough to be able to get up over the box of



the pointe shoe. A foot that is not flexible enough will have problems throughout pointework, as extra strain will be placed on tendons which will try to help keep the foot en pointe. In the meantime, keep stretching your feet, ladies!
